

# **Patient Self-Care Policy**

Including prescribing for minor ailments and/or self-limiting conditions

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## 1. Background

The NHS Cheshire and Merseyside (C&M) Patient Self-Care Policy is based on guidance published by NHS England. The policy enables NHS C&M to fulfil its duties to the people of C&M and the NHS, around appropriate use of resources and to supporting prescribers in their prescribing practice.

This policy does not remove the clinical discretion of the prescriber in accordance with their professional duties.

This document aims to promote greater uniformity with national advice and make local prescribing practices more effective. NHS C&M will focus on implementation locally; ensuring decisions consider the legal duties to advance equality, to have regard to reducing health inequalities, to address social vulnerability and to consider levels of poverty within our population.

## 2. Policy rationale

Self-care is widely acknowledged as an important solution to managing demand and keeping the NHS sustainable. Self-care provides people with the ability to take greater control of their health and wellbeing.

Patients can access self-care advice in several ways including on the NHS website, via the self-care forum (<a href="www.selfcareforum.org">www.selfcareforum.org</a>) or the NHS App, by accessing NHS 111 and from community pharmacy. Many community pharmacies are open for extended hours including evenings and weekends and are ideally placed to offer advice on the management of minor conditions and lifestyle interventions.

NHS 111 and general practices may signpost or refer patients to community pharmacy colleagues for advice and to purchase over-the-counter medication. The appropriate purchase of over-the-counter (OTC) medicines supports the management of NHS resources.

The cost to the NHS for prescribing medicines to treat minor conditions are higher than the cost of the medicine alone due to additional costs such as dispensing fees and GP consultations.

The National Pharmacy First Service was launched in January 2024. This is a service provided by Community Pharmacy which involves pharmacists providing advice and NHS-funded treatment, where clinically appropriate, for seven common conditions: sinusitis, sore throat, acute otitis media, infected insect bite, impetigo, shingles, uncomplicated urinary tract infection in women.

Consultations for these seven common conditions can be provided to patients self-presenting to the pharmacy as well as those referred by NHS 111, general practices and others.

In the consultation with a pharmacist, people with symptoms suggestive of the seven conditions will be provided with advice and will be supplied, where clinically appropriate, with a prescription-only treatment under a Patient Group Direction (PGD). Medicines supplied under a PGD will be free for those that are exempt from prescription charges.



Where a patient does not meet the gateway criteria for supply of medication under the PGD they may be offered advice on self-care and symptom management. This may include recommendations on the use of an over-the-counter (OTC) or Pharmacy only (P) medication. The supply of any OTC or P medication in this instance is not funded as part of the Pharmacy First Service.

The Pharmacy First service also incorporates provision of support for wider minor illness consultations by a pharmacist following a referral from NHS 111, general practices and other authorised healthcare providers i.e. patients are not able to present to the pharmacy without a referral. The range of minor illness appropriate for referral is not defined and can incorporate any condition that is appropriate to be managed and treated via patient self-care or with the support and advice of a pharmacist.

Where locally commissioned, a Minor Ailments Service (MAS) enables community pharmacists to support wider minor illness conditions and supply an appropriate medicine from an agreed local formulary.

This policy is intended to encourage people to self-care for minor illness as a first stage of treatment. It is envisioned that in most cases these minor conditions will resolve with appropriate self-care. If symptoms are not improving or responding to self-care the patient should be encouraged to seek further advice. It is not intended to discourage patients from going to the GP practice when it is appropriate to do so.

Locally commissioned MASs are not available in all C&M Places.

### 3. Scope

- This policy applies to all NHS C&M commissioned services.
- This policy is intended for all patients (adults and children) who are registered with a GP or who access NHS services across C&M who are suffering from acute, minor, or self-limiting conditions which are suitable for self- care with products that are available without a prescription.

# 4. Equality

The aim of this policy and related support materials is to meet the diverse needs of the population to be served. NHS C&M is committed to ensuring equality of access and non-discrimination, irrespective of age, disability (including learning disability, neurodiversity), gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex (gender) or sexual orientation.



# 5. NHS Cheshire and Merseyside Prescribing Guidance for Minor Ailments and/or Self-Limiting Conditions

NHS C&M supports the national NHS England policy guidance for conditions for which over the counter items should not routinely be prescribed in primary care:

NHS England » Guidance on conditions for which over the counter items should not routinely be prescribed in primary care

An NHS C&M self-care matrix (Appendix 1) makes it easy for prescribers and patients to see the most appropriate way to access medicines for minor ailments and/or self-limiting conditions.

Recommendations are made to address over the counter items which would fall into one of the following three categories:

- 1) Those of **limited clinical effectiveness**: the item should not be routinely prescribed in primary care due to limited evidence of clinical effectiveness.
- 2) Those used to treat **self-limiting conditions**: a prescription for treatment of a condition should not routinely be offered in primary care as the condition is self-limiting and will clear up on its own without the need for treatment.
- 3) Those used to treat **minor conditions suitable for self-care**: a prescription for treatment of a condition should not routinely be offered in primary care as the condition is appropriate for self-care.

NHS C&M will support and signpost their residents to self-care solutions whenever possible and appropriate.

There will be occasions however where prescribers may use their clinical judgement when consulting individual patients for a minor ailment and will decide if a prescription for an OTC medicine is warranted. Circumstances where this may be appropriate are detailed in section 5, general exceptions, below.

# 6. General Exceptions to Prescribing Guidance for Minor Ailments and/or Self-Limiting Conditions

The following are example scenarios where it would be appropriate for patients to continue to have their treatments prescribed:

### 6.1 Chronic and Complex Conditions not classed as minor



- Patients prescribed an OTC treatment for a long-term condition (e.g. regular pain relief for chronic arthritis or treatments for inflammatory bowel disease).
- For the treatment of more complex forms of minor illnesses (e.g. severe migraines that are unresponsive to OTC medicines).
- For those patients that have symptoms that suggest the condition is not minor (i.e. those with red flag symptoms for example indigestion with very severe pain.)
- Treatment for patients with complex conditions (e.g. immunosuppressed patients).
- Prescription only treatments.
- Patients prescribed OTC products to treat an adverse effect or symptom of a more complex illness and/or side effects of prescription only medications.
- Circumstances where the product license doesn't allow the product to be sold over the counter to certain groups of patients. This may vary by medicine, but could include babies, children and/or women who are pregnant or breast-feeding.
- Patients with a minor condition suitable for self-care that has not responded sufficiently to treatment with an OTC product.
- Patients where the clinician considers that the presenting symptom is due to a condition that would not be considered a minor condition.

# 6.2 Exceptional Circumstances, Socially Vulnerable Patients and Patients Living with Poverty

- Circumstances where the prescriber believes that in their clinical judgement, exceptional circumstances exist that warrant deviation from the recommendation to self-care.
- Individual patients where the clinician considers that their ability to self-manage is compromised because of medical, mental health or significant social vulnerability to the extent that their health and/or wellbeing could be adversely affected, if reliant on self-care. To note that being exempt from paying a prescription charge does not automatically warrant an exception to the guidance. Consideration should also be given to safeguarding issues.
- Where a prescriber, through their knowledge and clinical judgement believes that
  the patient will be unable to access a minor ailment service, the prescriber may use
  their judgement to decide if a prescription for an OTC medicine is warranted, in line
  with the rationale of this document, national guidance and the general exceptions
  detailed above.

# 7. OTC (non-prescription) Medicines in Nurseries and Schools

Prescribers in C&M will not accept requests for prescriptions of OTC medicines solely for the purposes of enabling administration within a nursery or school. The MHRA licenses all medications and classifies them as OTC when it considers them safe and appropriate to be used without prescription. Medicines purchased OTC to treat minor self-limiting conditions include dosage instructions and patient information leaflets with information relating to the medicine.

The relevant Department of Education guidelines supporting this are detailed below:

### 7.1 Nurseries

The <u>Early years foundation stage (EYFS) statutory framework - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> governs the standards of institutions looking after and educating children from birth to 5



years. The framework states that "Prescription medicines must not be administered unless they have been prescribed for a child by a doctor, dentist, nurse or pharmacist (medicines containing aspirin should only be given if prescribed by a doctor)." "Medicine (both prescription and non-prescription) must only be administered to a child where written permission for that particular medicine has been obtained from the child's parent and/or carer. Providers must keep a written record each time a medicine is administered to a child and inform the child's parents and/or carers on the same day, or as soon as reasonably practicable."

There is a clear distinction made between prescription and non-prescription medications. Therefore, a non-prescription medicine can be administered by a member of staff in a nursery or school if written permission has been obtained from a child's parent or carer and a written record of administration is kept.

A prescription is only necessary for administration of a prescription only medication.

### 7.2 Schools

Department of Education guidance for governing bodies of maintained schools & proprietors of academies in England , <u>Supporting pupils with medical conditions at school - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u>

"Wherever possible, children should be allowed to carry their own medicines and relevant devices or should be able to access their medicines for self-medication quickly and easily. Children who can take their medicines themselves or manage procedures may require an appropriate level of supervision. If it is not appropriate for a child to self-manage, relevant staff should help to administer medicines and manage procedures for them."

### Children should therefore be allowed to self-medicate where appropriate.

"No child under 16 should be given prescription or non-prescription medicines without their parent's written consent — except in exceptional circumstances where the medicine has been prescribed to the child without the knowledge of the parents. In such cases, every effort should be made to encourage the child or young person to involve their parents while respecting their right to confidentiality. Schools should set out the circumstances in which non-prescription medicines may be administered"

"A child under 16 should never be given medicine containing aspirin unless prescribed by a doctor. Medication, e.g. for pain relief, should never be administered without first checking maximum dosages and when the previous dose was taken. Parents should be informed"

This makes clear that non-prescription medicines can be administered with written permission from the child's parent. There is no requirement for a prescriber to provide consent for the administration of a non-prescription medication.

Schools should only accept <u>prescribed</u> medicines if these are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration, dosage and storage. The exception to this is insulin, which must still be in



date, but will generally be available to schools inside an insulin pen or a pump, rather than in its original container

This makes clear that the requirements for labelling of medications with instructions for administration only applies to prescribed medications.

# 8. Non-prescription (OTC) medications in care homes

The National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) published <u>Managing</u> <u>medicines in care homes</u> which advises on processes for prescribing, handling and administering medicines in care homes. It also recommends how care and services relating to medicines should be provided to people living in care homes, including advice on the provision of OTC medicines for care home residents.

The Care Quality Commission (CQC) also published <u>Treating minor ailments and promoting self-care in adult social care</u> which explains homely remedies and provides information on supporting residents in care homes to self-care where appropriate and advises that carers should support people who receive social care to access OTC products to enable them to self-care, appropriate safeguards should be in place. There should also be policies in place to support people who wish to access OTC products in a timely manner. This document also covers how the administration of the OTC medicines to residents should be documented.

# 9. Malaria prophylaxis

Medicines for malaria prophylaxis are not prescribable on the NHS. Private prescriptions should be written for prescription only medicines for malaria prophylaxis.

Some medicines for the prevention of malaria are available for the patient to purchase over the counter at a community pharmacy. If this is the case a prescriber need not write a prescription.

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
